## **Course description**

## **Class Time**

The co-op classes will be as scheduled according to PEP. The class time will be spent discussing important points from the book. Class discussion will be encouraged, and note-taking is highly recommended. Part of the student's grade will be based on his/her efforts to be included in the discussion. Students will have weekly reading assignments from the textbook as well as other sources. Students are expected to be in class on time with the appropriate materials.

### Homework

The homework for this course will consist of reading and completing the assigned textbook passages. The assignments are to be completed according to the schedule. Parents will be responsible for checking the homework for correctness, but assignments will be collected according to posted due dates and graded for completeness. It will be necessary to remove the binding from the student textbooks so that only the assigned pages can be turned in when necessary. Please be sure to staple the pages together and have the student's first and last name written at the top of the first page. There will also be a class participation grade (including unexcused absences or tardiness) that will require students demonstrate effort in class (e.g., note-taking). Late homework assignments will only be accepted for excused absences within the following week. Homework will be performed and graded the following way: Students should carefully, thoroughly, and self-critically complete the homework exercises. Students then check the exercises using their brains. Then they present their work to parents, who should initial on each page that all answers have been completed. THEN AND ONLY THEN can parents give students access to the answer key. Students can use the answer key to make corrections to their original work. Do NOT erase old answers, but writethe correct ones in a different color ink.

### **Tests**

There will only be one official test per quarter, and is a takehome test that will be sent home near the end of each quarter.

#### Quizzes

Quizzes will be given at the beginning of most classes. They will focus on the last week's lesson and homework, but will also include review questions.
